expensive while insurance reimbursements have not kept pace, even declining in some instances.

Our only hope is the strength provided by a unified front. Regrettably, many Millennials are not joiners, so membership numbers are in decline.

Finally, over a quarter of the poll respondents recognize the threat that decreased student enrollment poses to our schools, residencies, and ultimately our future. To ensure podiatry's survival, it's up to each and every podiatrist to promote this profession. This means speaking at career days in local high schools, participating in health fairs, and volunteering to act as a mentor to prospective students.
